PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What an inspiring and rejuvenating experience we had at our 2007 AMTA annual conference! It was wonderful to see so many of you here in Birmingham renewing friendships, sharing teaching experiences, and learning even more tips to use in our own studios. While I am certainly a strong advocate for attendance at national conferences, I do understand that the costs of travel combined with the rising registration fees make these larger conferences difficult to attend on a regular basis. However, we are doing a tremendous job of bringing nationally and, indeed, internationally acclaimed artists and clinicians to our own state conferences for a very minimal cost to each attendee. Nowhere else could you attend over 10 workshops, an artist recital, recitals by professional musicians from throughout the state, numerous student recitals *and* a full catered banquet for only \$50! I want to thank Kevin Chance for the incredible job that he did in making all of this possible for us. Please take the time to drop him a note of appreciation for all of his hard work for our organization.

Everyone I talked to was stimulated by the wonderful session on practicing

that was led by Shearon Horton. Her extensive 8-page handout with recommendations for specific practice techniques in each of four style periods (Baroque, Classical, Romantic, and Impressionistic) is a wealth of information. I am sure that we all found ideas that we already use regularly, some ideas that are similar to those we use but with a new twist, and some completely new ideas that we can't wait to try! The *Practicing and Motivation* discussion groups which were led by our own members gave us all the opportunity to share what has worked for us as well as a forum to ask questions of our colleagues about a particular challenge we have encountered. The small groups of 12-15 teachers provided the occasion to have each of our voices heard. As we all know, there is never only one way of achieving success; and what may work for one student may not work for another. So we must all continually strive to expand our "repertoire" of teaching practices in order to keep our students inspired and motivated.

Jean Barr's sessions on chamber music gave us great insight into working with young chamber musicians as well as tips for preparing our students to be ensemble pianists. Scott McBride Smith shared with us the

pedagogical considerations behind the new *American Popular Piano* series. And, of course, we received some terrific "goody bags" at this session which contained several full-length books from the series! Our guest artist, Anne Koscielny, thrilled us with her colorful performances of Beethoven, Ravel, and Schumann on Friday night. What an inspiration to see this lady with such a warm, engaging personality deliver such a powerful performance!

Rounding out these guests artists were thought-provoking sessions by several of our very own. Don Bowyer demonstrated examples of music software on the internet. What valuable, *free* resources he shared with us to help enhance our teaching! We all have faced those students who are concerned with playing the right notes at the right time, but their performances just don't seem to "speak" to us. Barbara Laurendine presented us with some creative ways to try to get our students to share more personality when they play. Barbara Shinn again led the ever-important *Workshop for Judges*. There are always some interesting issues that arise in this session and even those of us who are "seasoned" judges find something new and informative each time.

And finally, the amazing student recitals that we hear each year at

AMTA TEACHER OF THE YEAR

During the 2007 Alabama Music Teachers Association Conference, Hilda Hagins, received the AMTA Teacher of the Year award. The award is presented annually to a member who exhibits excellence in teaching, musicianship and service to AMTA and the community.

Hilda, from Enterprise, AL, has been teaching for over 35 years. She is a nationally certified piano and organ teacher and proprietor of her own music studio. She is also a member of the Alabama Music Educators Association, Music Educators National Conference, American Guild of Organists, and the National Guild of Piano Teachers. In addition, she serves as Music Associate at the First Baptist Church in Enterprise.

In 1994 AMTA District II had been inactive for several years when Hilda took the task of District II Auditions chairman. The auditions were held in Enterprise for the first time and she continued as chairman for ten years. Also in 1994 Hilda founded the Wiregrass Music Teachers Forum affiliated with AMTA and Music Teachers National Association. The forum began with four members and has grown to a membership of twenty-two. With Hilda's guidance, the first Sonata/Sonatina Festival was held in 1995 with fifty-two students registered. The Sonata Festival has been held each year since, and now has approximately 175 students who participate. In addition, the forum sponsors a Piano Hymn Festival each November to give the students an opportunity to prepare and perform music suitable for offertories and congregational hymn accompaniments. In May the forum holds an Honors Recital during which time scholarships for summer piano camps and scholarships to forum students who are college music majors are presented.

For the fifth anniversary of the Sonata Festival, Hilda suggested commissioning composer Kevin Olson to write new work for piano. The result was "Sonatina in Seasons," dedicated to the Wiregrass piano students. Mr. Olson attended the festival as well as the recital at which the work was premiered. For the tenth anniversary, Mrs. Elizabeth Greenleaf wrote a special work, "Wiregrass Sonata," which was also dedicated to the students. Like Mr. Olson, she also attended the Festival and recital.

In addition to teaching piano and organ, Hilda teaches Elementary Music, grades K-6 at two elementary schools in Enterprise. She has volunteered at Holly Hill Elementary School and founded and directed the Holly Hill Echoes, a vocal performance group made up of thirty-five students in grades four through six.

Hilda enjoys judging and often serves as an adjudicator for various scholarship, sonata and keyboard festivals. She judges for the National Guild of Piano Teachers as well as AMTA District Auditions.

As Organist and Music Associate at First Baptist Church of Enterprise, she serves as Children's Choir Coordinator, overseeing eight choirs from preschool to grade six. Hilda believes that music is meant to be shared and she feels blessed to be a part of celebrations in the lives of the church family as she prepares music for weddings, funerals and other events marking milestones in the lives of many. Sometimes Hilda must play "through her tears" to comfort families with the music in their times of great loss. Hilda feels blessed to be able to share these events with the church members, friends and students in the community.

Since the terrible aftermath of the tornado that struck Enterprise on March 1, 2007, Hilda has seen the tremendous healing power of music as the young people in high school have expressed their sorrow, their gratitude and their hope for the future through their music. The outpouring of love and support has been tremendous. Many music organizations have reached out to the choral and band students who have experienced this tragedy.

Hilda states that she is very humbled by this award. She believes that the most important treasures in life are faith, family and friends, and that music is one of the threads that weave these relationships together. "We teachers must carry the torch and light the way for a new generation of students so that they can experience the gift of music."

Reflections on Betsy Barrett

Betsy Barrett, President of AMTA from 1970-1972, passed away recently in Mobile, Alabama. Although she had been ill for a few years, those who knew Betsy can reflect on what a dear friend she was to so many of us. She was a wonderful educator, as well as a composer, a journalist, and a leader. One of her best compositions, *The Cinderella Suite* for piano solo, was a favorite throughout the state when it was published. The "Lament" from the suite is still available. It is published by Alfred. Betsy wrote two small method books on teaching theory for teachers to use in preparing piano students entering AMTA auditions. The method books are Getting Into Scales and Arpeggios, Book I and Getting It Together, Book II. I still remember Betsy's student group presentation of this concept at an AMTA Convention!

Mrs. Barrett was very active in local associations in Tuscaloosa, the Piano Teachers Forum and Tuscaloosa Music Teachers Association; and at the state level of AMTA, serving in several executive positions as well as her term as President. She was encouraging to young teachers and she delighted in sharing musical ideas with others.

She was kind, caring, and interested in her friends and associates. She and her late husband, Henry Barrett, were instrumental in developing the string program in the association.

It is sad to lose a friend and a mentor. As I reflect on her life, I am glad our paths crossed. We, as music teachers, should strive to inspire others as Betsy Barrett did during her lifetime.

I am planning to make a memorial contribution to the *da capo* fund in Betsy Barrett's memory. The funds from the *da capo* fund will be used

to promote artists and clinicians in future AMTA conferences. Betsy would be pleased!

IMPORTANT NOTICE!!

There is a strict AMTA policy that states that a teacher may enter only his/her own personal students in our auditions. This means that if there is a "studio" which employs several teachers, each teacher must be a member of AMTA to enter students in the auditions. A teacher is not allowed to enter any nonmember's students. If you are "mentoring" a student teacher, the student teacher may join AMTA at a discounted student rate in order to be eligible to enter students in the auditions. Page 3 of our Students Activities Handbook outlines the consequence of not abiding by this policy. Under **Eligibility**, the next-to-last sentence states:

"Any member of AMTA who enters the student of a nonmember will be suspended from AMTA membership for one year."

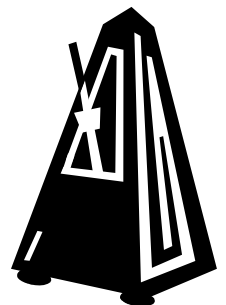
The 2008 Audition Forms will require that each teacher sign a statement indicating that all of the students entered by that teacher are indeed his/her own students.

AMTA/MTNA 2009 COMPOSITION COMMISSION

Alabama Composers are invited to submit an application to be considered for an Alabama Music Teachers Association and National Music Teachers Association commission award.

The commission award is \$1000.

The composition must be completed by April 1, 2009

The commissioned composer must attend the June, 2009 AMTA conference (date and location to be announced).

The commissioned work can be for any size ensemble. However, the commissioned composer must provide performers for the performance of the commissioned work at

the AMTA conference. The composer is responsible for covering the cost of the performers and travel.

The commissioned work will be submitted by AMTA to NMTA in the Shepherd Distinguished Composer of the Year award. The composer will supply AMTA with a recording of the work for this submission. If the work wins the SDCY award, the composer will be responsible for providing the performer(s) for the presentation of the piece at the national conference (Composers will receive \$3000 for winning the SDCY).

Submit the following to Charles Norman Mason, AMTA Composition Commissioning Chairman, Box 549033,

Birmingham-Southern College, Birmingham, AL 35254:

- a. At least two, and no more than three scores and recordings (cassette or CD)
- b. Resume

A letter of intent detailing proposed commissioned work (instrumentation, length, etc.).

Educational Music Software on the Internet

If you were one of the people who got out of bed for the technology session at the AMTA Conference June 1, then you are excused (and thank you both). This column will be a summary of that session.

Computer-Assisted Instruction in Music

Software that teaches music has been around for 40 years, starting with big main-frame computers in the 1960's. The latest generation of this type of software runs over the Internet, and is usually made in Java, Javascript, or Flash.

This software can be divided into five categories:

Drill-and-Practice software often works like flash cards, helping the student learn through repetition.

Guided Instruction software can be compared to textbooks, guiding the student through educational material.

Game software should be self-explanatory.

Exploratory software packages are analogous to multimedia coffee table books, frequently delving into a subject from multiple directions.

The **Creative** software category includes programs that either give the student an opportunity to create music or assist in practicing music.

The most common subject areas for CAI music programs are music theory, general music (including music history), and performance.

Below are thirteen examples of CAI music programs that work on the Internet. All of these are free to access. Each example includes the web address and my opinion of the appropriate age, the subject matter covered, and the category of instruction. Some cover more than one type or subject. These are obviously subjective in some cases, so please feel free to form your own opinions!

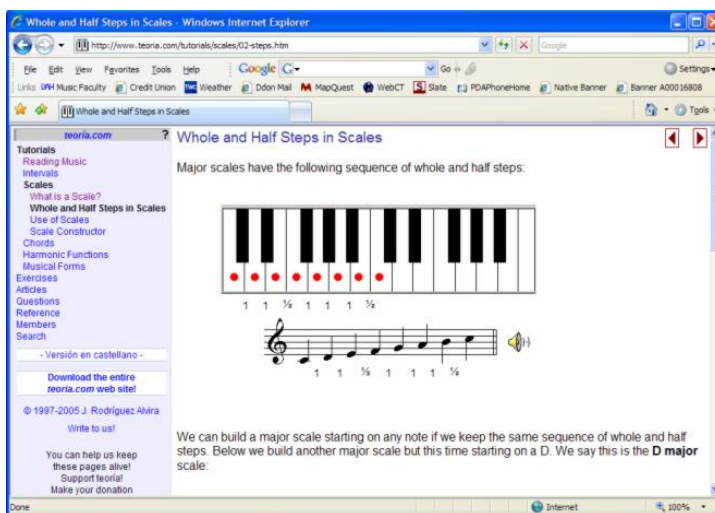

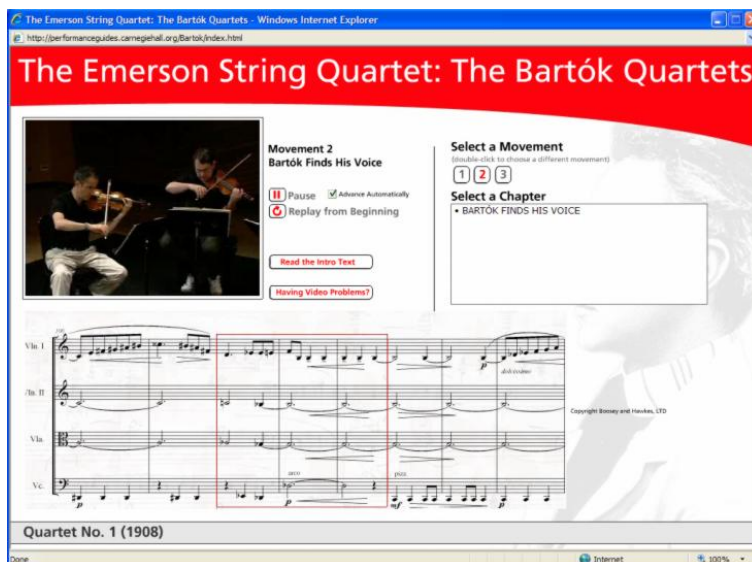

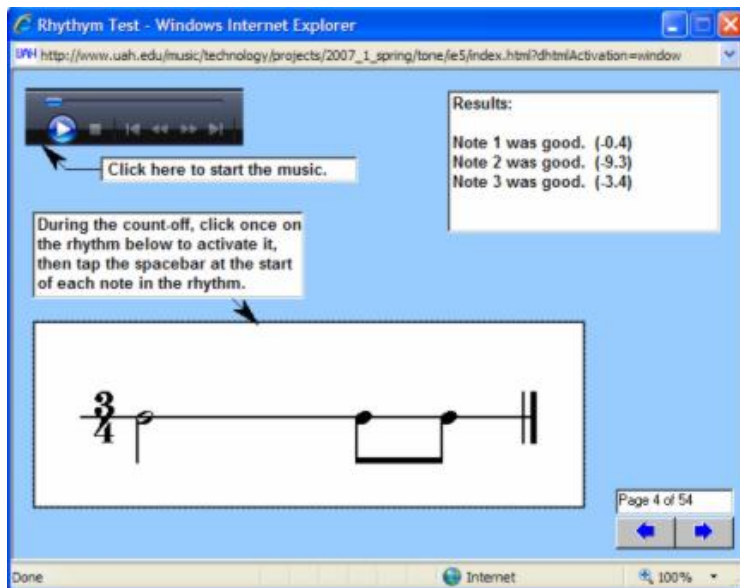
