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### **Guest Artist: Anthony Padilla**

Anthony Padilla is a professor of piano and chamber music at the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music and the 2017 recipient of Lawrence University's Excellence in Teaching Award. An American pianist of Filipino-Chinese ancestry, Padilla receives public and critical acclaim for performances of "enormous freshness, vitality and poetry" (Chicago Tribune). Recognized internationally as pianist of remarkable sensitivity, refined interpretation and dazzling technique, he joined the Concert Artists Guild's distinguished roster of soloists in 2000 as the top prizewinner of the Concert Artists Guild International Competition. A native of Richland, Washington, he first performed as soloist with the Mid-Columbia Symphony at age nine, made his debut with the Seattle Symphony Orchestra in 1983, and has since become a popular guest artist with orchestras and at concert series and music festivals throughout North America, Europe and Asia. Highlights include solo and collaborative appearances at the Ravinia, Chautauqua, Schleswig-Holstein, Holzhausen,



Victoria, Sarasota, Cascade, Bay View and San Luis Obispo Festivals. After his New York debut recital, the New York Concert Review called him "a strong-willed, steel-fingered tornado; he plays the piano with absolute authority and gives new meaning to the idea of 'interpretation' to the extent that the U.S. Patent Office might well grant him a number. Nobody could copy him."

A graduate of the Eastman School of Music, Mr. Padilla studied with Nelita True, Jeffrey Kahane, Natalya Antonova, Béla Síki, Leonard Richter, Donald Walker and Jorge Bolet. Awarded the prestigious Beethoven Fellowship by the American Pianists Association in 1991, Mr. Padilla is also a laureate of the Gina Bachauer, Cleveland, William Kapell and Walter Naumburg International Piano Competitions. In addition, he has received major prizes from the National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts, the Society of American Musicians, the Music Teachers National Association, the Koszciuszko Foundation, the Harvard Musical Association and the Theodore Presser Foundation. He is a founding member of the Arcos Piano Trio, which was recently awarded an Artistic Excellence grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to commission and record chamber works by Latin American composers.

A nationally certified member of the Music Teachers National Association, he is a popular adjudicator and presenter at state, regional and national levels, and his students regularly earn top prizes at MTNA, Wisconsin Music Teachers Association, Neale-Silva, Seattle International and several other competitions. His lecture -recital on "The Classical Sense of Humor" stirred much interest at the MTNA National Convention in Los

Angeles. His recordings on Centaur, New World and White Pine include premiere recordings of Coleridge-Taylor Perkinson's Statements--Second Sonata for Piano, and chamber works by American women and Latin American composers with the Arcos Trio.



### **Guest Clinician: Gail Berenson**



Gail Berenson is Professor Emerita of Piano at Ohio University, Athens, where she was awarded the "Distinguished Teacher of the Year" Award in 2000 and the "Distinguished Service" Award in 2016. Prior to coming to Ohio, she was on the faculty of the University of Illinois, Urbana. An active performer and passionate chamber music collaborator, she performs with flutist, Alison Brown Sincoff, as a member of the Ohio University Lyric Duo.

As a result of her distinguished work as a piano pedagogue, along with her reputation as an expert on musician wellness issues, she is much in demand as a performer, clinician, masterclass artist, adjudicator, author, reviewer and pedagogy consultant. She has performed and lectured in over thirtythree states and eleven countries. She has been a presenter at the European Piano Teachers Conferences in Manchester, England; Funchal, Madeira; and Amsterdam, Netherlands; served as a guest clinician at the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Association's National Conferences in Halifax and Vancouver, Canada; and presented sessions at four World Conferences of the International Society of Music Education in Beijing, China; Thessaloniki, Greece; Porto Alegre, Brazil; and Glasgow, Scotland. She has also served as a piano instructor in Yamaha's Passport to Music program, in cooperation with Crystal Cruise Lines.

Ms. Berenson began to build a reputation as a performing artist early when at age eleven she began accompanying the forty-member male chorus conducted by her piano teacher, appearing in concert throughout Wisconsin and Illinois. A native of Kenosha, Wisconsin, she continued her education at Northwestern University, completing degrees in piano performance, studying piano with Louis Crowder and Guy Duckworth. She also performed in master classes with world-renowned accompanist Gerald Moore, baritone Pierre Bernac, duopianists Vronsky and Babin and, at the Lucerne International Music Festival, with pianist and accomplished chamber musician, Mieczyslaw Horszowski.

Ms. Berenson is one of the co-authors of *A Symposium for Pianists and Teachers: Strategies to Develop Mind and Body for Optimal Performance* and, as a member of the Lorenz Advisory Board she contributed to the innovative piano method, *Piano Discoveries*, and is co-author of *Ask the Professor*. She has also authored three chapters for the fourth edition of the Lyke, Haydon, Rollin book, *Creative Piano Teaching*, published in spring 2011. Ms. Berenson has also written articles for *Keyboard Companion*; the on-line journal, *Piano Pedagogy Forum*; and served as a contributing editor to *Piano & Keyboard*.

She is a Past President of Music Teachers National Association, an association of over 23,000 members, and in 2015 was awarded MTNA's prestigious "Distinguished Service Award." She has also held the position of President-Elect, President, Vice President, and Chair of the 2002 and 2003 MTNA National Conference Committees; has served on the 1996 and 1997 Conference Committees; and was one of the founding members of the MTNA Pedagogy Committee. A powerful advocate for musicians' health, she has served as the founding chair of numerous wellness committees, helping associations begin their foray into this topic. She served as one of the founding members, representing the United States and the piano area, as a member of the International Society of Music Education's Forum on Instrumental and Vocal Teaching and also helped initiate and chair the Musicians' Health and Wellness Special Interest Group, currently serving as one of its special advisors. In 2015 she initiated the College Music Society's Committee on Musicians' Health and continues to serve as its chair. She has held several national posts with the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy and the World Piano Pedagogy Conference and chaired the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy's Committee for Pianists' Wellness for many years. She recently was the recipient of the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy's 2019 Outstanding Service Recognition Award. A Past President of the Ohio Music Teachers Association, she holds MTNA's Master Certificate in piano and piano pedagogy and was the recipient of the 1999 OMTA "Certified Teacher of the Year" award and the 2004 OMTA "Collegiate Teacher of the Year" award. In recognition of her significant contributions to the music world and the music teaching profession, she was awarded an MTNA "Foundation Fellow Award" in 2007. Now a resident of Sarasota, Florida, she serves on the Sarasota Concert Association Board and is Co-Chair of the SCA's Music Matinees Concert Series. Her students are performing and teaching in independent studios and on college faculties throughout the world.

At this event students prepare a hymn at their level with the corresponding scale to perform for a judge. Memorization is not required. More advanced students also perform another selection of their choice. All students went home with certificates of participation and big smiles.

Musicalooza is the BCMTA's music camp to prepare for the spring competition season. This was held on January 25 in Robertsdale at Grace Fellowship Baptist Church. Students registered for this day camp which included masterclasses, dancing, ear-training, games, rhythm cups and boom-wackers. All wore a t-shirt with the theme of the camp, Jazz. Our guest artist was Adam Schrubbe, a jazz pianist from New Orleans, who taught the blues scale, jazz chords and improvisation to the upper level students. A dance instructor came to give beginning lessons on swing dance. All went home with a ribbon and big smiles having enjoyed the day.

Events that are planned for this spring include a Boys Recital February 8 at the Summerdale Civic Center. This is exclusively an all-boys event. They prepare a memorized selection to share with others. This event seems to be a big hit with the boys who dress in suits and ties without having to share the stage with girls.

Our adults have their day to shine in late March at our Adult Musicale. This is held at the Steinway Piano Gallery in Spanish Fort. The environment is very relaxed and nurturing. 
