All of us have people in our lives that have influenced us. Donna Shugart, Nancy Wingard, Elbert Lingo, and Edna Brown are people in our organization who helped me grow as a piano teacher. Nancy is still influencing people with her judging and teaching. Edna Brown was not an officer with AMTA, but she supported AMTA and sent her students to auditions and other performances. Kevin Chance was one of her most notable students. Edna spent her life at Birmingham-Southern College and Conservatory, striving to make our students as prepared as they could be. MTNA will honor her memory by naming her a Foundation Fellow in April at the Gala during the National Conference. We are proud to call her one of our own. Thanks to so many of you who helped raise the money for this honor.

Who are you influencing? Are your students going to honor your name when you retire? **Become** more involved with the workings of our wonderful organization. **Send** your students to the many auditions, recitals, and festivals sponsored by the local, state, and national organization. **Volunteer. "We believe that when our students see successful music students and professional musicians, it keeps them motivated and practicing. *Performance Today* provides the perfect platform for this," says Chriesman.

Performance Today is a half hour mini concert that starts at noon on Saturdays. In addition to performing, many of the visiting performers entertain questions from the students or give tips on practicing, instrument maintenance, etc.

It is a great opportunity for music students to perform a new piece in front of a low pressure audience, or for seasoned musicians to entertain and inform a new generation of musicians. They are open to any sized group (including soloists) and any style of music.

The Shoals Area Music Teachers Forum began their calendar year 2015-2016 with a business meeting at the home of President Elizabeth Counts. Carol Lynn and Kristie Smith shared their wonderful AMTA conference experiences with members, especially the sessions presented by Dr. Peter Mack.

Our September meeting was a "first" for our forum, as we held a "Member Panel Discussion". Each member presented a short session on the topic of their choice. A few of the topics included "Practice and Performance," "Keyboard Theory: Pacing/Organization" and "Studio Book Keeping". Every topic resulted in engaging discussion.

October's "Repertoire Sharing" was held at the home of Noel Beck and included many "walks down teaching pieces memory lane" as well as being introduced to many new pieces and composers. October 17 was also the date of our yearly "Make It Minor" piano performance PARTY. Each student performed a solo selection written in a minor key. Most students performed in Halloween costumes, which added a festive "note".

The 1st Sunday in November is always reserved for our "Ritz Recital". This performance event is for our more advancing students and is held at the beautiful art deco Ritz Theater in the historic downtown area of Sheffield.

The *World Championship of Old-Time Piano Playing* began on the back platform of an old railroad caboose in Monticello, IL in 1975, the brainstorm of The Monticello Railroad Museum's founder and contest emcee Ted Lemen. Capitalizing on the box office success of the movie "The Sting," this small gathering of music-lovers quickly blossomed necessitating a move to larger facilities. After 41 years, most recently in Peoria, IL, this contest and festival has moved to a new home in Oxford, MS at The University of Mississippi.

Held annually to coincide with Memorial Day weekend, this event has become truly international in scope, boasting the largest, most comprehensive competitive events for pianists steeped in the musical genres of ragtime, honky-tonk, boogie-woogie, traditional jazz and blues. Students up to age 18 can compete for cash prizes and trophies in the Junior Division while the Regular Division contestants vie for trophies and larger prizes in excess of \$5,000. Performers compete in period costume, are interviewed before each round, and show their incredible musical skills in an attempt to advance to the Finals. Complete rules and guidelines are posted on the event web site.

Smaller contests precede the main competition. These include a New Rag Contest, Duet Contest and a "Cutting" Contest, a throwback to the days of Fats Waller and Eubie Blake where contestants try to "cut" the competition and the audience chooses the winner. Workshops by acclaimed guest artists and the world's greatest sing-along are held around the competitions with a guest artist concert concluding the weekend's activities. Off-site excursions, catered events at local restaurants and the "Ring of Ragtime" at venues on the historic Oxford Square add a refreshing dimension to the festivities.

If you love ragtime, jazz, blues, honky-tonk, boogie or novelty songs from the days of *Tin Pan Alley*, then you'll have the time of your life in Oxford on Memorial Day weekend. Tickets for catered events, the bus tour & luncheon, the opening Tune-ups party and the guest artist concert are also available for separate advance purchase on the web site. Guest artists include three-time champions Brian Holland and Adam Swanson as well as concerts from Sue Keller and "Blind Boy" Jerron Paxton. We'll see you in Oxford May 26-30, 2016. This much fun ... ought to be against the law!
