AMTA is also one of the few states that has professional development opportunities in multiple instrumental disciplines at our state conference. We have consistently sponsored strings and voice clinicians and workshops along side piano. AMTA and MTNA are "Music Teachers" organizations and AMTA will continue to pursue development opportunities in all instrument areas. Two years ago the board had 14 open positions that needed to be filled and last year we had 6 open positions. Thank you all for making the 68th Annual AMTA Conference/2020 AMTA Virtual Conference possible. We continue the tradition to celebrate music teaching, learning, and performance in Alabama through the digital platform. This first virtual conference could not have been made into reality without all your incredible work to continue your music teaching and preparing students for the auditions amid the sudden shifts to all things online. My heartfelt gratitude to all of you for working tirelessly to make the local and state auditions highly successful during the challenging times. Thanks to the dedicated hard work and support of AMTA members and volunteers, the 2020 AMTA Virtual Conference was held through the AMTA website on June 12th-18th, free and open to the general public. The deadline for winners' video submissions was May 29th, 2020 and we received 115 videos. The online submission process went smoothly, and the Virtual Technology Team worked hard to create the virtual recitals. 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Syble Coats Tribute

I was deeply saddened when I learned that one of West Alabama Music Teachers Association's most exemplary members, **Syble Morrow Coats**, passed away on June 24, 2020. She is survived by her husband, Gordon Coats; her daughter, Brittley Coats Graviet and her husband, Kristopher Graviet; her grandchild, Hayden Graviet; and by other family members and friends.

I first met Syble in the mid-1990's, when I was a new faculty member at the University of West Alabama. I was at Southeastern Music Gallery in Tuscaloosa shopping for music. I do not know how Syble knew me, but she called me by name and introduced herself. She told me she had scheduled a guest presenter to work with her students at Shelton State Community College and invited me to attend. Little did I know that would be the theme of many conversations for years to come. Syble had performances or projects in progress, she wanted as many people as possible to benefit from her activities, and she would extend an invitation.



Syble was an excellent musician and a highly accomplished pianist. She was very proud of her education, which included Bachelor and Master of Music Degrees from the University of Alabama. She was especially grateful for her studies with Professor Amanda Penick. While working at Shelton State, she was given the opportunity to play at Carnegie Hall twice. I was fortunate to hear two of her local performances. The more recent occasion was on October 9, 2019, when she and Lillian Roberts performed a program of piano duet music for the Demopolis Music Study Club. To say that Syble performed "as long as her health permitted" is a bit of an understatement. Syble performed that afternoon with the assistance of an oxygen tank and an oxygen tube. She also needed a walker to make it from the car to the piano. The music was beautifully played, and the recital is a memory I will always cherish. Our music club is so grateful to Syble and Lillian for making this effort.

Syble was a passionate and dedicated teacher. She was a faculty member at Shelton State for 38 years until her retirement in 2014. From 1979-2005 she was the Department Chair. She organized the weekly "Terrific Tuesdays" recital series. In 2005 she was awarded the Dr. and Mrs. John W. Todd Award for Excellence in Teaching from Shelton State. During that same year she was awarded the Druid Arts Award for Music Educator of the Year by the Arts and Humanities Council of Tuscaloosa. In 2010 she received the Alabama Music Teachers Association Teacher of the Year Award. Her AMTA Award is the topic of an (unsigned) article from the July 2010 Issue of the *Soundboard*. In the article Syble said of her own teaching, "If a student has the desire and ambition to learn, then as a music educator, my job is to provide the tools for the student to be successful."

Syble truly understood the importance of volunteerism and service. Her contributions to the West Alabama Music Teachers Association are numerous. She was President from 1998-2005. Later she became the Public Relations Officer and organized student recitals. I was always pleased when my students played for the AMTA District Auditions and Syble was the adjudicator. She also served on the AMTA Executive Board as 2nd Vice President, Independent Music Teachers Forum Chair, and as Treasurer. I always admired the enthusiasm and energy Syble brought to any activity she organized. Her commitment was the same, whether her own students were participating or not. When my students performed for WAMTA recitals, Syble always took the time to congratulate them and to thank the parents for making it possible for the students to come.

Syble was a member of the Tuscaloosa Music Club and the Alabama Federation of Music Clubs. For many years she was the organist at Forest Lake United Methodist Church. According to Syble's Obituary, she was involved in many community activities and college committees. Her volunteerism was not limited to music.

Well Syble, your performances have been played, your students have been taught, your Department Chair duties have been completed, and your volunteer activities are now finished. Everything you did for us, you did well. It is now our turn to follow your example. We thank you, and we miss you. We admire you, and we honor you. - Piano Duet (one piano/four hands) Age: 11–18 as of January 1, 2021, with at least one student age 15–18.
- Competitions: Brass, Piano, Piano Duet, String, Voice and Woodwind
- Performance Entry Fee: \$110

Division Video Submission Fee: \$20 paid directly to Acceptd.

Young Artist

- Age: 19–26 as of January 1, 2021
- Competitions: Brass, Piano, String, Voice and Woodwind
- Performance Entry Fee: \$120

Division Video Submission Fee: \$20 paid directly to Acceptd

Chamber Music (3–6 performers)

- Age: Ensemble members must be 18–29 as of January 1, 2021
- Competitions: String and Wind
- Entry Fee: \$120 for each ensemble

Video Submission Fee: \$20 paid directly to Acceptd

The National Finals of the competitions are March 13-14, 2021, in Atlanta, Georgia.

Entrant Requirements

The following requirements must be met by the application deadline; otherwise, the entrant is not eligible to enter the competitions.

Each entrant must:

- Study with a teacher who is (1) a member of MTNA or (2) pay the Nonmember Teacher Fee of \$150.
- Be a U.S. Citizen or must hold a U.S. visa or permanent residence (green card), which is valid throughout the competition year.
- Reside in the U.S. during the competition year.

Meet age requirements as specified for each competition.

Entrants may enter any MTNA competitions for which they are eligible. Entrants may enter each individual competition in only one state according to the following:

Solo and Composition Competitions:

Enter either (1) in the state where the entrant has permanent residence or (2) in the state where the instruction takes place. For distance learning, the state where the instruction takes place is defined as where the entrant is located during *Skype*, *FaceTime* lessons or similar means of instruction.

Piano Duet Competitions:

Enter either (1) in the state where at least one member of the duet team has permanent residence or (2) in the state where the instruction takes place. For distance learning, the state where the instruction takes place is defined as where the duet team is located during *Skype*, *FaceTime* lessons or similar means of instruction. If the permanent residence of the team involves two different states, the teacher(s) determines the state of entry.

Teacher Requirements

- Teachers must be aware of the entrant requirements.
- The teacher listed on the application is the teacher of record and shall remain so during the competition year. In the event the entrant changes teachers during the competition year, both teachers, past and present, will be listed as the teachers of record. Any exception is at the sole discretion of the MTNA Director of Competitions in consultation with the Competitions Committee, but in no event will the entrant be disqualified as a result of a teacher change.
- The teacher and the entrant may not be the same individual. Teachers must reside in the U.S. during the competition year.

MTNA Member Teachers

• Current active membership dues for MTNA must be paid prior to accessing the competition application. MTNA members are not required to be members in the state of entry. An MTNA collegiate member must pay active membership dues to enter students.

Nonmember Teachers

Nonmembers teachers entering students are encouraged to pay current active membership dues for MTNA or entrants will be assessed the \$150 Nonmember Teacher fee at the time of application.
